### **Hydro Anniversary**

In his 1887 essay Pastoral, Robert Louis Stevenson called the River Gynack "The golden burn that pours and sulks in the den behind Kingussie."

On February 15th, we marked the 10th anniversary of the community Hydro on the "golden burn." Nearly 80 people joined us for a hydro tour and a bowl of soup at Kingussie Golf Club.

It was great meeting you all – thank you for your support!



The Hydro project was the vision of the late Donnie Grant, KCDC's first Chair, who was a passionate advocate for the environment and our community.

From the start, local volunteers managed the commissioning and construction, and that same spirit continues today.

Volunteers handle maintenance and daily operations and if you're near the hydro bridge, look down and you might spot them hard at work.

Stop for a chat, and who knows? You might end up joining in.

Hydropower has shaped the Gynack for a century. The current scheme uses an old weir from a 1920s hydro plant that powered St. Vincent's Hospital.

Today, the energy created powers Kingussie Golf Club and surplus feeds into the national grid. Hydro income funds community projects through KCDC's Hydro Fund.


In 2024, £21,000 was granted to support 14 projects including the Tennis Club, Shinty Club, Festival of Words, Food and Film Festival, the High School, Primary School and the new Repair Café.

### **Hydro Report: A Smooth Year**

Since its commissioning in 2015, the KCDC Hydro has been a cornerstone of sustainable energy in our community. This year, once again, operations have been running smoothly, with no unplanned shutdowns apart from a couple of short power cuts and a day lost because the Gynack froze over.

Although overall output this year was slightly down on the best of previous years, the Hydro continues to deliver around 40,000 kWh per year, as projected at the time of the original design. KCDC has now reached the halfway point in the payment of the feed-in tariff, which will continue until 2035.



There was a planned shutdown in May in that involved replacing another 2 of the 6 Coanda inlet screens.

The performance of the hydro is critically dependent on the efficiency of these screens, some of which were damaged by ex-Hurricane Berth in 2014 and in subsequent spates.

The worst two were removed and replaced in 2020. They were then repaired and strengthened by our local blacksmith, Davie Cameron and refitted by volunteers. This involved diverting the water to one side of the river with sandbags and removing screen sections to get into the chamber underneath.

Needless to say, some of our stalwart volunteers got very wet!

Whilst the screen chamber was open, a plate was installed to improve the flow of water into the pipe that feeds the turbine. This work has improved the performance at both low and high river levels.

In particular, during the December 2024 spate, the turbine did not suddenly lose power in the way that it had done in the past.

In addition, the Pitmain flood alleviation scheme that was commissioned in the summer has played a crucial role in maintaining a steady flow for the Hydro during heavy rainfall by diverting water through Loch Gynack.

This year we have also improved accessibility and safety at the Hydro, with the installation of a walkway and safety line stanchions. As a result, the routine task of clearing boulders from the top of the weir to maintain the correct water flow distribution was completed very efficiently by the efforts of the volunteers in the paths group.

Looking ahead to next year, the Hydro will undergo an assessment of future maintenance requirements and arrangements for long term operational support. This will help ensure its continued smooth operation for the next 10 years (and beyond?).

As we reflect on another successful year, we extend our thanks to everyone involved in maintaining and improving this vital community asset. Here's to another year of smooth running!

### **Paths Update**

Kingussie's network of paths has seen a remarkable transformation over the past few years, thanks to the hard work of volunteers from the paths group.



Highlights from 2024 have included significant work on the Golf Course Circular and Creag Bheag paths. The paths group also contributed to the Glebe Ponds project, in partnership with Kingussie and Vicinity Community Council and have been able to repurpose the boardwalk to create new benches that are situated around the path system.

Another highlight was the publication and launch of the paths leaflet covering Kingussie and surrounding paths. With 10,000 copies distributed so far, it has been warmly received by locals and

visitors alike, helping to guide walkers through the area's stunning landscapes.

Recently, volunteers have been hard at work on the path to Raitts and have recently reviewed the five-year rolling paths plan.



Priorities for 2025 include renewing the steps from the Hydro to Ardbroilach Road and enhancing the north side of the Creag Bheag path.

With so much achieved and more to come, the future of Kingussie's paths is looking brighter than ever.

## **Cycle Friendly Kingussie**

We returned to Glen Tromie for the 2024 edition of the Bikeathon, moving the mid-point entertainment a bit further down the glen to make it more accessible for some of our family riders.

The event saw some challenging weather conditions, so we were glad of this decision. Once again, there was the climb over from Glen Feshie as an option for more ambitious riders.

We introduced a balance bike element, with a trip out to Tromie Bridge for our mini riders and with funding from Sustrans Scotland we were also able to team up with **Able2Adventure** and offer some adaptive cycles, making it the most inclusive event yet!

This year's Bikeathon, on the 15th of June 2025, will see a change to the route, incorporating some on and off-road elements, and once again featuring the stunning scenery of Glen Feshie.



Keep your eyes peeled for more information coming soon. The adaptive cycles and balance bike ride will feature again this year.

The "balance bike picnics" continued last year and were a great success with up to 20

little riders circulating around the Gynack Gardens. These will return on the first Sunday of the month from April.

Tuesday evening ride outs also continue throughout the year, meeting at 18:30 at the Gynack Gardens. We also host a road ride on the first Sunday of the month.

#### Woodlands

Kingussie Community Woodlands are part of the River Spey Special Area of Conservation and extend from just below the Golf Course to The Cross.

They are owned by KCDC on behalf of the community and managed and maintained by volunteers.

They provide a rich habitat for birds. Robins, chaffinches, blackbirds, tree creepers, coal tits, great tits, blue tits, wrens, willow warblers and woodpeckers are regularly spotted. Inhabitants also include moths, butterflies, bats, red squirrels and roe deer.

KCDC has planted saplings, including hawthorn, willow, apple, and holly which further enrich the woodland.

This past year we have seen a small amount of ash die-back but the encouraging growth of oaks, Scots pine and hopefully some aspen.

Our woodland management tasks have included fence repairs and improving accessibility by clearing and cleaning the railway sleeper steps past The Cross and adding reflective strips to the steps leading down from Gynack Road to the bridge at The Cross.

We have continued with regular litter picking, clearing debris from paths, and removing leaves from bridges. Deadwood is left standing where possible to support wildlife.

We have also made efforts to control non-native species, including sycamore and snowberry.

We thank everyone involved in taking care of the woodlands, particularly Gilmour and Susan Strang for their continued dedication and hard work.

#### **Spey Street Junction**



We are delighted to have delivered this key civil project in collaboration with Highland Council and Sustrans.

Thanks are due to the Highland Council's Active Travel and Road Safety teams who managed the programme of works.

Having constructed a pavement and provided a clear route to and from the station to the town via the recently upgraded gardens, the junction offers a sense of arrival for travellers to and from Kingussie. The project also creates much needed and welcomed traffic calming at a very busy junction between both schools.

We are grateful to 'Strath Civil Engineering' for their professional engagement and practice in delivering the project for the town.

To be able to attract inward investment to Kingussie is no mean feat and we regard it as a significant achievement for the community.
